**Entertaining
Pop Concert**

Heard By Few

Last night's Pop Concert at Massey Hall drew one of the smallest crowds of the season, but the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, conducted by Paul Scherman, and baritone soloist Donald Garrard, provided an evening of unexpected sparkle.

One would expect that the many empty seats would tend to dampen the enthusiasm of the orchestra, but such was not the case. Those in attendance, numbering less than 1,000, heard an orchestral program that was musically sound. Mr. Garrard gave one of his best vocal performances.

The musicians were best in the quick-tempered portions of the program. The opener was a group of hymns usually associated with New Year, followed by the familiar Frescobaldi-Kindler Toccata with some beautiful work from the violins. Rossini's overture to Cinderella was well presented, and the ballet music from Gounod's Faust, although lacking spirit at times, had many good points about it, particularly in the more dynamic passages.

ENTERTAINING

Dance of the Hours, a Strauss waltz and a medley from South Pacific, completed the orchestral program which was always entertaining, and mostly well played under Mr. Scherman's excellent direction.

Mr. Garrard first appeared in a most reverent interpretation of it is enough, from Mendelssohn's Elijah. There was complete control of the voice here, and passages that were filled with sincere understanding. Diction was perfect throughout.

AMUSING

The amusing aria from Rossini's Barber of Seville had a richness of tone but frequently lacked color. In the Mozart aria from Don Giovanni, however, he presented some beautiful song shaded with wonder flexibility and a tonal depth and timbre that was exciting.

With Leo Barkin at the piano Mr. Garrard presented a group of delightful numbers, the best being the poignant Lord Randall. In this he displayed the dramatic qualities of his vocal art. All day on the prairie, and the Welsh air, Counting the Goats, were both given with complete understanding and careful interpretation.

The amusing encores by Sten-dale Bennett, which Mr. Garrard always does so well, brought prolonged applause from a most appreciative and enthusiastic audience.

Starting Monday, a Toronto broadcaster will be going on the air twice a day over Florida stations, giving up-to-the-minute news—from home.

The idea originated when it was found that Canadians in Florida frequently asked other Canadians "what have you heard from home?" Dave Price, Toronto broadcaster, found that "unless you were lucky enough to run into someone who had been talking to Canada, you never did find out."

That disappointment will be obviated come this Monday. For six days a week, Monday through Saturday, "300 for" a 13-week schedule, Dave Price will give a five-minute newscast each morning. They will be carried on Station WKAT, Miami Beach, at 9:25 a. m. and on Station WLEA, Tampa, at 9:55. Dave will "phone the newscasts to the stations where they will be recorded for broadcast at the times noted. He will cover headline news, weather (to give holiday-makers a chance to gloat), sports and a brief market resume.
